Maybe we can ask what our Lent does for others rather than just what we are doing for Lent. It is a time of renewal, then it shows in love, forgiveness and care of others in our lives.





Parish Webcam

Last October we invested in a Parish Website (arlesparish.ie). It was created as a platform to communicate any relevant notices and parish information. During periods of lockdown, where our weekly newsletter could not be circulated, we needed some other means to communicate with parishioners. I was also mindful that this website could eventually host a Parish Webcam where we could broadcast our parish masses and religious services into people's homes. After paying for the setup costs of the website we didn't have funds to go the extra step and install a webcam so that stage of development was put on hold.

I now feel, more and more, that we need to invest in a webcam because 2021 has been one long period of lockdown and it is set to remain so for the coming months ahead. Whilst the parish radio system helped us during the previous lockdowns, its broadcasting capability really only covers Ballylinan village. The truth is that some people can receive a signal and many others cannot. To address this inadequacy I am currently working on setting up a webcam in Arles Church - I hope that it will mean that our Sunday and weekday masses are available to everyone throughout the parish and that we can celebrate Easter together. Even those family members who have moved away from the area or who are overseas can stay in touch via the webcam.

The cost to the parish is not insignificant in these very lean times. I estimate it will cost us €5,000. I ask for your support for this project and thank all those who continue to support our parish during this very difficulty times. Any donation, however big or small, will certainly help alleviate the costs and any further burden on our parish finances that are under strain as it is.
