

First reading

A reading from the prophet Ezekiel

The angel brought me to the entrance of the Temple, where a stream came out from under the Temple threshold and flowed eastwards, since the Temple faced east. The water flowed from under the right side of the Temple, south of the altar. He took me out by the north gate and led me right round outside as far as the outer east gate where the water flowed out on the righthand side. He said, 'This water flows east down to the Arabah and to the sea; and flowing into the sea it makes its waters wholesome. Wherever the river flows, all living creatures teeming in it will live. Fish will be very plentiful, for wherever the water goes it brings health, and life teems wherever the river flows. Along the river, on either bank, will grow every kind of fruit tree with leaves that never wither and fruit that never fails: they will bear new fruit every month, because this water comes from the sanctuary. Making a whip out of some cord, he drove them all out of the Temple, cattle and sheep as well, scattered the money changers' coins, knocked their tables over and said to the pigeon-sellers, 'Take all this out of here and stop turning my Father's house into a market.' Then his disciples remembered the words of scripture: Zeal for your house will devour me. The Jews intervened and said, 'What sign can you show us to justify what you have done?' Jesus answered, 'Destroy this sanctuary, and in three days I will raise it up.' The Jews replied, 'It has taken forty-six years to build this sanctuary: are you going to raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking of the sanctuary that was his body, and when Jesus rose from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they believed the scripture and the words he had said.

Dedication of the Basilica of St John Lateran



It's somewhat strange that the church celebrates the dedication of one basilica, even if it is the church of the Pope. The readings of the Mass highlight why.

The stream of living and healing water comes from the temple in the first reading. The temple of the people was not just to be a building, but what happened inside the building would be healing and fruitful.

A church building is a place and space for God and his people. We come to the building to be refreshed in sprit and enlightened in mind, and to find all this in the community of the people.

Jesus had strong views on what the temple was for: in finding it used as a place of business and to exploit the poor, he got angry. His action in expelling with conviction and energy those buying and selling within the holy place would almost cost him his life.

Paul's letter brings things a bit farther. Despite the importance of a place for God, in the end we are God's building. The foundations of the church are not stone and mortar, but all of us, united in faith and leadership.

Every city, village or town needs its reminders of God, and the church building is that. So for one Sunday we remind ourselves of the importance of a place for God. We move on and realise that our worship of God is in spirit and in truth. No matter what the beauty of our buildings, God wants the beauty of our love, dedication, prayer and service. The church building highlights the place of faith and prayer in life, and Jesus' words about business in the temple remind us of the truth that all belong in the church of God, building and community, because of God's love and call of each of us.
